





# PhotoShop Elements and the Green Screen


	<p>Open Adobe Photoshop Elements found in the Applications Folder on the lab computers.</p>
	<p>Select Edit in the menu of the splash page.</p>
	<p>When the program opens, go to File and choose Open.</p>
	<p>A new window pops up, select the picture with the green screen background and click the Open button.</p>
	<p>Your picture will show in the work area. To the left are the tools. Click on the Quick Selection Tool. Looks like a magic wand with a dotted line circle at the tip.</p>
	<p>The menus at the top will change. Click on the pop up menu indicator to get the pop up menu to appear. Slide the slider bar to the right to increase the size of the brush. 64 px is big enough,</p>
	<p>Start at the top of the picture you want to cut out. Click and drag watching the marching ants adhere to the edge of the picture and work your way down to get all of the picture selected.</p>



Click on Select in the menu bar.


Select Inverse.

Inverse means opposite. Now the marching ants are selecting the picture.




Go over to the right where you see your picture.

Point to it and right click then choose Duplicate Layer in the menu.





Go ahead and leave the name as Background copy and click OK.




Now go up to File and choose Open.

Select the picture you want for your background and click the Open button.



Your work space will look like this. One picture is on top of the other.

To get your green screen picture to come forward, double click on the thumbnail in the picture tray.




Go to the Move Tool at the top of your tools and click on it.



Click on the center of your green screen picture and drag it down you will see 2 pictures.  
Your target picture is your background picture in the picture tray at the bottom of the work area.




Keep dragging until your mover arrow is touching the back ground picture. Then let up on the mouse.




Your picture might be really bigger than your background picture.  
Click on it and drag it to the left until you see the dotted line and the corner anchor.




Click on the corner to see a two pointing arrow and click and drag diagonally to the upper left side.



Then click and drag the center of the picture down and go back to the corner and drag to make the picture smaller until you see the whole picture.



When you have the picture moved and placed where you want it, click the green check you see at the bottom right side of the green screen picture.




Go to File and choose Save.

Select the place where you want to save your final picture.

Name the picture.

In the Format field, click on the pop up menu indicator and select JPEG.

Now Click Save.



Click OK on the next dialog box that pops up.

Now you can exit.



Click No to the next dialog boxes. We don't need to save our pictures in Photoshop Elements format.
